 Each day read on your own for 20 minutes. Draw and describe the main character of a book you are reading. How are they similar to you? Draw a diagram if you are reading a non-fiction text Look at 'Canine Catastrophe' on Pobble365 and write a story over the coming week. Write a sizzling start. Decide if the book you are reading is fiction or non-fiction. 	 Each day choose one of your sets of times tables to practise. Monday Ask someone in your family to write ten two- or three-digit numbers. Can you round them to the nearest ten? Find three surfaces in your home that have a larger area than your homework book. Draw and label what you have found. Toss a coin twice and record the outcome. Repeat the experiment two more times. Describe what you notice about the results. Tuesday Find 3 surfaces in your home that have a smaller area than your homework book. Draw and label what you notice about the results. 	 Tuesday Think of a situation in nature where a plant provides shelter for an animal. Draw and write about the interactions that take place between the two living things. 	Monday Draw and describe one of the Aboriginal artefacts that you have learnt about at school. Share this with someone at home.
 Continue with your story 'Canine Catastrophe'. Decide on 3 problems (pebble, rock and boulder) and write them out. Don't forget your 5 senses and to tighten tension! Write a review of your book. What hooked you? What might you change? How many stars out of 5 might you give? Add a fabulous picture to accompany your review. 		Creative Arts Monday Collect a range of natural materials from around your home (e.g. leaves, flowers, twigs). Use these to create a nature collage.	 PDHPE Monday Every day this week, record an activity you have done to help your body or your mind stay healthy. Tuesday Use a ball (or a pair of socks rolled up) to practise throwing and catching. You could do this on your own or with someone at home. Count how many times you can catch the ball in a row, without dropping it!

Question time!

Sentence challenge!

Good writers always try to start sentences in different and interesting ways. Can you write a sentence that begins with a noun?

E.g. Sammy, who was afraid of heights, was petrified as he lifted off the ground.

Dogs, who feel comforted by their owner's presence, become uneasy when they are separated.

The noun is always followed by a comma and the sentence contains a relative clause in the middle.





Sick sentences!

These sentences are 'sick' and need help to get better. Can you help? Could you add an adverb?

- The dog started to float.
- The dog felt scared.
- Beth didn't know what was happening to the dog.





Perfect picture!

Can you draw what happens to Sammy the dog? Where does Sammy eventually land?
